Dr Shivanand Chavan is Consultant Anaesthetist at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, University Hospitals Birmingham NHS Foundation Trust. He graduated from MR Medical College, Gulbarga University and completed Post Graduate training in anaesthesia from the Post Graduate Institute of Medical Education and Research, Chandigarh. He joined Birmingham School of Anaesthesia for specialist training in 2003. He joined department of anaesthesia, Queen Elizabeth Hospital as a consultant in 2009, with special interest in Regional and Burn anaesthesia. His post graduate qualifications include MD (Anaesthesia, PGIMER, India), FRCA (RCoA, London, UK) and European Diploma in Regional Anaesthesia (EDRA, ESRA, Europe)

Dr Chavan has been instrumental in introducing US for regional anaesthesia at his current hospital. He was also involved in setting up and running Block Area for the Birmingham Hand centre which is based at QEHB. He is involved in teaching and training RA across the region. He is faculty in US guided RA course which is run by Birmingham group and has been invited to speak and run workshop at the national meeting in North West region.

He has been invited as guest speaker at ISA Karnataka state meeting (2015), ISA South Zonal meeting (2016) and ISA National annual congress (2017).
